Polly Samson, novelist

Where are you now and what can you see?

I am at the kitchen table. It's mayhem - there's a recently incubated chick in a birdcage hanging from a beam above my head and a puppy asleep on my feet. The table is strewn with everyone's half-finished projects - my son has decided to make us all hats, so those are jumbled up with dishes of my mother's Chinese dumplings, a flower press, a semi-whittled spoon and the newspapers, which today are lightly burned because the baby switched up the oven while no one was looking.

What are you currently reading?

Cloudstreet by Tim Winton and Monkey Grip by Helen Garner. I've also just finished reading the proofs of Featherhood, a memoir by my son, Charlie Gilmour.

Who is your favourite author and why do you admire her/him?

My favourite at the moment is Anne Tyler. I carry on thinking about her characters long after finishing their stories.

Describe the room where you usually write...

I write in a shed in the garden. It's a tip, with piles of books, photographs of my characters and Post-it notes all over the walls. If the door is open, there is a view over fields, but the roses I planted have scrambled over the walls and obscured the windows.

Which fictional character most resembles you?

I'll plump for Erica, the narrator of my new book *A Theatre for Dreamers*. If only I'd had the guts to go and live on a Greek island when I was 18!

Who is your hero/heroine from outside literature?

The investigative journalist Carole Cadwalladr. She interviewed me years ago and afterwards we walked our dogs for miles through a rainstorm. I liked talking to her so much I didn't notice we were getting soaked. I watch in awe as she takes on the bullies of political corruption and wish I had even half of her courage and temerity.
